Minutes of the Meeting April 3, 2024

The meeting was opened with a reading of the Sunshine Law. A motion was made by Karen Wright and seconded by Jesus Lopez. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

ROLL CALL

Present: Karen Wright, Margie Pollard, Laverne Hill, Hersell Smith, Jesus Lopez, James K. Grace, Carolina Valdez, and Catherina Rutland

Absent: Dorraine Robinson and Ignacia Washington

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

A motion to approve the regular minutes of the March 6, 2024 meeting was made by Jesus Lopez and seconded by Hersell Smith. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

OLD BUSINESS

STATUS REPORT

Catherina went over the status report. She stated we currently have one vacant unit at Penn Towers and no vacant units at Silver Run Park.

Catherina reported that they are not processing any eviction cases at this time.

Catherina reminded the Board about the following events planned:

- 1. Tuesday, May 14, 2024 Atlantic City Bus Trip leaving Penn Towers at 8:30AM.
- 2. Tuesday, April 2, 2024 Spring Fun Day for Silver Run tenants at noon
- 3. Friday, April 19, 2024 Healthy Living Fair at Penn Towers at noon
- 4. Friday, May 17, 2024 Senior Prom for Penn Grove Seniors 55 plus 5PM to 7PM

Catherina informed the Board that the Penn Towers roof was still being evaluated for the potential need of a wall flashing or other solution.

Catherina reviewed future draft plans for the parking lot expansion for Silver Run. She explained that the parking lot is in dire need of additional parking spaces. She noted that this project would be costly and would be placed on hold until we convert to Streamline Conversion RAD.

Catherina stated that Ignacia Washington had expressed interest in the PHADA 2024 Annual Convention from June 2nd to 5th in New Orleans information was distributed last month. A motion to approve Ignacia Washington to attend the PHADA 2024 Annual Convention was made by Margie Pollard and seconded by Jesus Lopez. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

Catherina stated that she received communication from Beth-el Church to place a plastic banner on the Silver Run Community Room. There was some discussion on the matter. It was decided that we would not have any organizations place banners on the outside of the community room since other organizations and tenants use the community room. It was suggested that a portable sign that can be taken in and out after any functions would be more appropriate for community room use.

STREAMLINE RAD APPLICATION SUBMITTED UPDATE

Catherina informed the Board that our HUD reps were continuing to evaluate our application for Streamline Conversion. There was some discussion on the matter. She stated to date she had not received any final decisions from HUD on our RAD application status.

RESOLUTION ANNUAL PLAN 2024-2025

Catherina presented the Annual Plan for 2024-2025 with Resolution 6-2024 with additional documents. There was some discussion on the matter.

A motion was made by Jesus Lopez to approve the Annual Plan for 2024-2025 with Resolution 6/2024 and seconded by Laverne Hill. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

NEW BUSINESS

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Margie Pollard made a motion to approve Resolution 7-2024 authorizing an Executive Session to discuss personnel matters. Hersell Smith seconded the motion and a roll call was made with all present approving the Resolution.

A motion was made by Jesus Lopez and seconded by Laverne Hill to go out of Executive Session. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

A motion was made by Laverne Hill and seconded by Jesus Lopez to go back into regular session. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL CONTRACT 2024-2026

In open session, Catherina restated that she is giving her official notice for retirement as of July 1, 2026. She explained that the contract being presented would be her last contract and would be a two year term. Catherina expressed her appreciation for her employment at the Penns Grove Housing Authority for over 25 years. The Board acknowledged Catherina's leadership and accomplishments. After some discussion, a motion was made by Jesus Lopez to approve Resolution 8-2024 to approve Catherina Rutland's employment contract from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2026. Laverne Hill seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by all present.

Catherina recommended that over the transition of the next two years it would be advantageous to have Carolina Valdez as the Assistant Executive Director complete the Executive Director courses given by Rutgers University for Executive Director. After some discussion, a motion was made by Laverne Hill to approve Resolution 8-2024 to approve Carolina Valdez to attend the ten classes for Executive Director offered by Rutgers University. Hersell Smith seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by all present.

ANNUAL SALARY INCREASES RESOLUTION

Catherina presented the Board with the budget page reflecting salary increases. A motion to approve Resolution 9-2024 for annual salary increases of 5% for all hourly employees and 3% for salaried employees for the period of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025 was made by Jesus Lopez and seconded by Laverne Hill. The motion was unanimously approved by all present.

RAD & SVC were designed by HUD to assist in addressing the capital needs of public housing by providing Penns Grove Housing Authority with access to private sources of capital to repair and preserve its affordable housing assets. Please be aware that upon conversion, the Authority's Capital Fund Budget will be reduced by the pro rata share of Public Housing Developments converted as part of the Demonstration, and that Penns Grove Housing Authority may also borrow funds to address their capital needs. The Penns Grove Housing Authority will expend all Operating Reserves and Capital Funds prior to converting to Project Based Voucher under the SVC Program.

Both Penn Towers & Silver Run Park will continue to be owned and managed by the Penns Grove Housing Authority. There is not demolition or relocation contemplated and all residents will be entitled to remain in their units after the SVC conversion. There will be no impact on the surrounding neighborhood and very little impact on the existing residents. Upon conversion to Project Based Vouchers, the Penns Grove Housing Authority will be closing our it public housing program.

Resolution Authorizing Executive Session

WHEREAS, the Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b permits a public body to go into a closed session during a public meeting to discuss certain matters as follows:

- (1) Matters Required by law to be confidential: Any matter which by express provision of the Federal law or State statute or rule of court shall be rendered confidential or excluded from the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act.
- (2) Any matter in which the release of information would impair the right to receive federal funding.
- (3) Matters involving individual privacy: Any matter, the disclosure of which constitutes an unwarranted invasion of individual privacy such as records, data, reports, recommendations or other personal material of any education, training, social service, medical, health, custodial, child protection, rehabilitation, legal defense, welfare, housing relocation, insurance and similar program or institution operated by a public body pertaining to any specific individual admitted to or served by such institution or program, including, but not limited to information relative to the individual's personal and family circumstances, and any material pertaining to admission, discharge, treatment, progress or condition of any individual, unless the individual concerned.
- (4) *Matters pertaining to a collective bargaining agreement:* Any matter involving a collective bargaining agreement, or the terms and conditions which are proposed for inclusion in any collective bargaining agreement, including the negotiation of the terms and conditions thereof with employees or representatives of employees of the public body.
- (5) Matters relating to the purchase, lease acquisition of real property or investment of public funds: Any matter involving the lease, purchase or acquisition of real property with public funds, the setting of banking rates or investment of public funds, where it could adversely affect the public interest if discussion of such matters were disclosed.
- (6) *Matters of public protection:* Any tactic and techniques utilized in protecting the safety and property of the public, provided that their disclosure could impair such protection.
- (7) Matters relating to litigation, negotiations and attorney-client privilege: Any matter of pending or anticipated litigation or contract negotiation other than in (4) above in which the Housing Authority is or may become a party. Any matters falling within the attorney-client privilege, to the extent that confidentiality is required for the attorney to exercise ethical duties as a lawyer.
- (8) Matters relating to the employment relationship: Any matter involving the employment, appointment, termination of employment, terms and conditions of employment, evaluation of the performance of, promotion or disciplining of any specific prospective public officer or employee or current public officer or employee employed or appointed by the public body, unless all of the individual employees or appointees whose rights could be adversely affected request in writing that such matter or matters be discussed in pubic.
